A New Age Epidemic

Throughout the United States, the fad of vaping has been rapidly gaining popularity amongst Americans. And with tricks, commercials, and features on television shows, vaping has become a worldwide phenomenon.

According to the CDC, the adult usage of cigarettes is at an all time low of 14%, but the opposite can be said of e-cigarettes. In 2017 it was apparent in a survey by the National Youth Tobacco Survey, that 11.7% of High School Students use E-cigaretts. A concerning statistic when one considers that one dosage of e-cigarettes can contain as much nicotine as an entire pack of cigarettes.

Despite their advertisement-suggested purpose of replacing cigarettes, e-cigs can be deadly. E-cigarettes are not FDA approved and can easily be laced with other drugs such as fentanyl and marijuana. As of 2019, over 800 people have been hospitalized and, according to CNN, 14 have died from related lung collapse. Vaping illnesses plague hundreds of families and communities across the United States. Newsday reported that only one death has been reported in New York State, as of now.

Those experiencing effects range from 50 year olds who are trying to quit smoking, to 16 year old varsity athletes. After being brought into the spotlight because of these illnesses, new research on e-cigs isn't looking good for kids who have been using e-cigarettes for a prolonged amount of time. However, some people are strong advocates for vaping because when used for its intended purpose, it can help people quit smoking. The Harvard health Publishing journal for Harvard medical school found that although e-cigarettes helped people to quit smoking, 80% of people who started to use e-cigarettes by the end of the study continued to use them. It is the marketing of flavored cartridges and enticing brands on social media and in social status that determines who is attracted to the idea of vaping.


Different states have attempted to ban e-cigarettes. Michigan has attempted to ban flavored e-cigarettes. The Trump Administration has also made claims that they want to ban e cigarettes. However there is going to be a long battle ahead of this is true, because if e-cigarettes are able to be banned, some argue the same can be said for regular cigarettes.

Kids need to understand that vaping is a drug addiction. People that use e-cigarettes have the same symptoms of withdrawal as those that use cigarettes or abuse opioids. Those worried about their addiction should talk to a trusted adult for help. Quitting is possible. Stop before it's too late.

On Monday, September 2nd, Labor Day weekend, here on Long Island, we were enjoying our last few days of summer, meanwhile, Dorian was acting as a category 5 storm in the Bahamas. This lasted for approximately 48 hours. In just the small yet large window of those two days, Dorian managed to kill more than 40 people, not counting the people it nearly killed.

By September 5th, Dorian had moved again. After being badly affected by 2018's Hurricane Florence, South Carolina and North Carolina had to prepare for another battle with another vicious hurricane. Once Dorian had traveled the east coast and arrived in the Carolinas, it spawned more than a dozen tornadoes in North Carolina. After causing such havoc down the east coast, Dorian traveled not much farther. By the next day the storm had slowly made its way to Carolina's Cape Hatteras, and with it brought high winds and heavy rain.

By September 8th, the long disaster of Dorian came to an end. Dorian made its way to its last destination in Nova Scotia, Canada. But unfortunately Dorian didn't go quietly. Before dissipating offshore, Dorian blew the power out to hundreds and thousands of people.

Dorian was one of the worst storms we've seen in a while. It caused damage everywhere it went-and it went very far- and it'll take a very long time for the places it affected to recover and heal from the damage it caused. Places affected by Dorian are still trying to heal and they can't do it alone. There are many ways to help survivors rebuild what's been broken. Some national and international organizations where one can donate include the SBP, Salvation Army, International Medical Corps, and Heart to Heart International. Also, the organization World Central Kitchen(WCK) have organized teams at four different locations across the Bahamas to cook meals for those badly affected by Dorian. Cultural Diversity is an important aspect for society. Learning about other cultures is not only beneficial for business but for our society. Cultural diversity allows people to learn about other cultures which helps people understand different perspectives and differences. Sayville High School is fortunate to contribute to cultural diversity by participating in a student foreign exchange program.

This year, Sayville High Schools welcomes Po-Yen Wang, who goes by Edmond, a 10th grade foreign exchange student from Taiwan. After talking with Edmond, I learned a lot of interesting tidbits about him. First, I found out that his parents chose the American name, Edmond. as his American name after they watched the movie "Chronicles of Narnia." After telling him that I was impressed with how well he speaks English, Edmond said that he started learning how to speak English in kindergarten, and that it is a requirement where he's from. Edmond said that he wanted to become a foreign exchange student to learn and experience different cultures firsthand, so he knew that learning to speak English was important.

When he first moved in with his host family, he was very nervous, as anyone that moves to a new country would be, but he quickly became comfortable with them. He said that he had visited the United States once before, but it was just for a vacation and that everything here in the U.S. is still new and different for him. One thing that was very new to him was school. In Taiwan, his high school is the National Hsinchu Senior High School. Edmond says that his high school in Taiwan is larger than Sayville High School, and that there are many different features between his Taiwanese school and his American school. One huge difference between the two schools is his school schedules. In Sayville, he said "I just go to school and leave at 3 and just do school work." But in Taiwan, "I go early in the morning and I am not finished until 9:00 or 10:00 p.m."

In Taiwan, there are many different parts that contribute to his day. The first thing he does when he gets to his school, is clean. All students are required to clean the school before and in between classes. After his morning cleaning session, he goes to study hall. Next, he starts his classes, and then he goes to lunch. So, after lunch all the students have to clean the school again and then they get to have nap time! You may be thinking that is unfair that they have nap time which sounds pretty appealing, but once you hear his whole schedule, you'll understand why it's necessary. After their nap time, they have more classes, and the regular school ends at 5 pm. However, Edmond's day isn't over,. After regular school ends, most students attend what he calls "extra school" from 5 to 9 or 10 pm. Also, Edmond said that school in Taiwan has much more homework than schools in the United States.

Another big change is the hobbies and activities that teenagers participate in. In America, kids do all kinds of sports, clubs, and physical games, while kids in Taiwan mostly just play video games and do things on their phones. Edmond says this may be due to the lack of time left in the day after school. Edmond said "I like to run, play basketball, table tennis, badminton, and hang out with his friends. Edmond says that he really likes American food, especially pizza and cinnamon rolls. Something interesting that he told me, was that there were a lot of "American" takeout places in Taiwan that sold many things, including fried foods, burgers, and fries. When I asked him what he misses about Taiwan he said the weather. He said that since Taiwan is so close to the equator it is very hot there and that it feels very cold here. He also told me that the thing he likes best in America is all the land we have. He said that Taiwan is very crowded and everyone lives in apartments due to the lack of space, but here most people have their own house and yard. He loves having his own room, and is very grateful for his host family and the house.

Lastly, he said that the hardest part of his transition was the swap of languages. He says that it is still a little hard talking and communicating with people, and he still needs to use his google translate sometimes. Edmond thinks that he might want to be a reporter when he grows up and he wants to come back to the United States after his time as a foreign exchange student expires because it is filled with opportunity. I would like to thank Edmond for giving me and *The Current* the opportunity to interview him and experience what it is like to be a foreign exchange student.

Book by Katie Ray



Clue, based on the board game and the movie, is a fast paced, mad cap comedy of murderers, rooms and weapons. Our favorite characters from the board game were brought to life by Amelia Wells as Mrs. White, Jude Ramsaywak as Miss Scarlett and Maya Guacci as Mrs. Peacock. 

Family Connection Day Survey Results

November 20 was designated one of several Family Connection days in Sayville Schools. Teachers were directed not to assign homework, nor plan tests for the next day, all in an effort to give students more time to spend with their families. *The Current* surveyed students the following day on how they spent that time.

Almost 90% of respondants reported that they were not assigned homework on Nov. 20. 47% of respondants replied that they did find themselves with more free time that afternoon and evening. Students reported utilizing that free time in a variety of ways. 47% indicated that they spent more time with their families. 14% indicated that they caught up on much needed sleep.

Ironically, on this day which had been designated by the school for students to spend more time with their families, over 16% of students responded that they still had school commitments, including detention, sports, rehearsals or club commitments.

Of the students who responded, 37% reported that their families had planned something different for that afternoon and evening. Sayville Movie Theatre and local restaurants enjoyed a busy night, and some families took advantage of the time to get a jump on their holiday shopping.
